A Short Note from BHS President, Phil Franklin

For those of you who have been members of or donors to the Bartlett Historical Society for any length of time, you know that our fall newsletter should be arriving in your mailbox or email box about now. However, I'm writing to let you know that we are holding off on this final newsletter of 2024 until after we open the museum. Our plans are to dedicate the fall 2024 newsletter to the museum with a



retrospective on how we came to have the opportunity to get into this major project and a "trip down memory lane" to get to where we are today.

On October 19, 2024, we are going to open our Bartlett Historical Society and Museum building with a public celebration. Our Grand Opening celebration will be the culmination of a journey that started roughly in 2013 and 2014. With this opening day, we join several other local historical societies with museums proudly displaying the history of their towns. Our initial displays will provide a broad view of the historical stories and events of Bartlett, Hart's Location, and Livermore. Looking to the future, we plan to take more focused looks at specific topics within our three-town scope.

Our Grand Opening celebration on October 19th will begin at 11:00 a.m. on the front steps of our building with a couple of speakers and a ribbon cutting. This will be followed by an open house until 2:00 p.m. Everyone is invited to this celebration and we hope that your first visit to our/your museum will be followed by many more in the weeks and months to come.

Final Museum Update

For years, we've provided updates on the renovation of the museum building. This update turns the focus to our preparations for the opening of the museum.

For the past several weeks, we have been focused on assembling all the things that will make our museum a museum. We've brought all our BHS collections into the building, sorted through them to determine what we will put forth for our initial displays and what we will store for future displays. We've been cleaning and painting the donated display cases, display units for our library of history and historic books have been made by a BHS volunteer, plans for the opening of the museum have been being developed, and our road sign has been under construction and is soon to be placed in our front yard. These are the highlights of our preparations for our opening day.

By the way, the Conway Daily Sun's Tom Eastman and photographer Rachel Sharples published a great feature article on our pending opening. Rachel was at the building as the movers from The Country Picker were moving in our display cases. Tom had a long interview with Phil Franklin before writing the article. It's in the Saturday, September 14, 2024 edition - the front page story. Our thanks to Tom, Rachael and the Conway Daily Sun for the coverage. Our thanks to Phil Leblanc from The Country Picker movers for their help also.

Please join us for a great meal at the Red Parka Pub on December 11th.
- ⇒ 2025 Presentations: We are finalizing our list of presenters for our 2025 Quarterly Presentation Series. Our first presentation will be with a NH Humanities speaker, Jo Radner on Sunday, January 12, 2025, 2:00 p.m. at our museum building at 13 School Street in Bartlett. Jo's topic is titled **Yankee**Ingenuity: Stories of Headstrong and Resourceful People. Jo shares a selection of historical taleshumorous and thought-provoking-about New Englanders who have used their wits in extraordinary ways to solve problems and create inventions. The talk will include discussion with the audience and may introduce a brief folktale or a poem about inventiveness and problem-solving. (This is the presentation was originally scheduled for October 16th but we cancelled due to the proximity to the museum opening date.)
- ⇒ 2025 BHS Membership Drive: Our 2025 BHS Membership Drive will begin with the start of the new year. In 2024, we had thanked 263 BHS members for their support. This reflected the highest level of membership that we've ever had at BHS. We hope that with the opening of our museum, our non-member donors will join as members and that our current members will renew with us again. Your membership in BHS demonstrates your active support for our work to preserve our local history and share that history with others. With the opening of the museum, we plan to now focus on expanding our offerings for programs focused on our local history. We hope that you will continue your support of your historical society and invite your friends to join us as well.

In closing, I'm reflecting back to the many different things that have occurred over the past several years to bring us to this day and historic moment for the Bartlett Historical Society.
